## **Course Overview**

This course is intended to provide an introduction to statistical analysis for Health Administration for MHA students. It is intended to acquaint (*or re-acquaint*) you with the basic concepts and procedures used in analyzing healthcare data. You will be introduced to the use of data analytics to facilitate decision-making tasks involved in the management of healthcare delivery processes.
