
MPH Student Accepts Congressional Internship

Florida: Collaborates with Stanford – Receives \$7.6 Million Grant to Expand Diabetes Program

A program designed to improve access to care and health outcomes for children and adults with Type 1 diabetes will be expanded with a \$7.6 million, three-year grant from The Leona M. & Harry B. Helmsley Charitable Trust. The Extension for Community Health Care Outcomes model, also known as Project ECHO®, is led in Florida by Dr. Ashby Walker, the director of health equity initiatives at the UF Diabetes Institute and an assistant professor of health services research, management and policy.
