PURPOSE AND OUTCOME

Course Overview

This course provides a descriptive and analytic overview of the economic underpinnings, historical roots, and current operation of the US health care industry. International comparisons and analysis of alternative proposals for reform or fundamental restructuring are also considered at the end of the course. Throughout, small group, peer-to-peer learning will be emphasized alongside specific content presented at lectures and in readings.

Course Objectives and/or Goals

Upon completion of the course, students are expected to be able to,

1. Describe the economic underpinnings of the US health care industry. Explain the assumptions underlying the theory of competitive markets, where these assumptions do and do not hold for health care, and their implications for care, cost and access.
2. Summarize the historical roots of the US health care industry, especially the role of various stakeholders (physicians, hospitals, drug companies, and insurance companies) in influencing legislation and otherwise shaping the structural elements of our current system, especially claims-based health insurance
3. Understand the impact and operation of key health care entities forged by legislation in the last half century: Medicare and Medicaid in 1965 and the Affordable Care Act in 2010.

4. Describe the current status of US health care in terms of care (safety and quality; evidence based practice), cost (price, utilization, cost-effectiveness) and equity in access (uninsured and underinsured).
5. Describe international comparisons of the U.S. and other high-income nations in terms of structure, cost and outcomes.
6. Summarize the pros and cons of various proposals for reform of specific elements of the industry, as well as the pros and cons of proposals for fundamental restructure.

Instructional Methods

Readings, lectures, and small-group learning exercises are the primary learning tools. The benefits that you receive from this course are directly related to your class preparation and participation---in other words, to the effort that you put into the course.

What is expected of you?

You are expected to actively engage in the course throughout the semester. You must come to class prepared by completing all out-of-class assignments. This preparation gives you the knowledge or practice needed to engage in higher levels of learning during the live class sessions. If you are not prepared for the face-to-face sessions, you may struggle to keep pace with the activities occurring in the live sessions, and it is unlikely that you will reach the higher learning goals of the course. Similarly, you are expected to actively participate in the live classes, especially the small-group sessions. Your participation fosters a rich course experience for you and your peers that facilitates overall mastery of the course objectives.

ACADEMIC REQUIREMENTS AND GRADING

Assignments and Exam

Small Group Presentations/Assignments (25% of final grade): As part of the small group sessions, groups will have a number of presentations and assignments that must be completed during the in-class session. There will be two topics per session. Each group will work on the first topic for 40 minutes, followed by presentations by two of the groups. After a short break, the process will be repeated for the second topic. For several sessions, students will be asked to submit their individual efforts in addressing a specific topic in advance of the group session (see 'Individual Assignments' below).

Individual Assignments (24% of final grade): Students will be asked to complete a number of individual assignments that will be submitted via Canvas **prior** to small group sessions.

Peer Evaluations (15%): At the conclusion of the course, students will complete a required peer evaluation for fellow small group members.

Systems Thinking Special Project (1%): Students will be required to complete causal loop analysis of the positive and negative feedback processes involved in the interface between health and the health system, focusing on an example such as health status for a type 2 diabetic, being uninsured, delaying care, use of primary care vs Emergency Department care, and behavioral and social determinants. Each student will be required to submit two pages: one including a list of bullets on the “negative” and “positive” loops and one with a causal loop diagram. Further details on this project, including its final due date, will be provided throughout the semester.

Final Exam (20%): This course has one final exam. The date is given on the course schedule. The final exam will cover the course materials, lectures, assigned readings, textbooks.
